Starting at the Top

Bob Whitman is new to the Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing. He's also new to house construction work. He is happily serving as the president of the Board of Directors for Fuller Center, after accepting the post about a year ago, about the same time he began with the organization.

"But, I have a mentor because I'm still learning," he said. "My mentor is Judy Blalack." Bob says he was introduced to Fuller Center through a friend, Norm Holtz, who was already serving on the board.

However, Bob has no background in housing construction. "I'm not a tradesman by profession," he said. "I'm a retired educator. But, I enjoyed that." In the year he has been working with Fuller Center, Bob says he has learned a lot. Drilling screws into wood is one thing, but there is also a lot of paperwork, he noted. The best part is meeting people and helping complete repairs.

The Fuller Center has been mostly helping people get repairs to the homes they already live in. Real estate and the costs of construction materials have gone up a lot, making it more difficult for low-income individuals to maintain their own house, much less purchase one. Where they would like to be able to help people obtain loans to build a house, or rebuild an existing house in poor condition, the focus more recently has been on repairing the homes in which people are already living. Sometimes the homeowners help with that work, if they are physically able. Other times contractors are hired and often volunteers join in to assist. They recently helped an individual with roof repairs in Smelterville and other repairs in Wallace. "Some of the people that volunteered are in need themselves," he noted.

Most recently Bob assisted Jim Taylor in "a little" of the work restoring the historic stairs in Wallace. Although that project did not directly provide housing to anyone, it did enable a Wallace resident to have safe access to her garage and to town from her home.

Bob did note the cost of building materials have come down some, and he hopes that in the future they will be able to expand into larger house projects. He expressed optimism that the Fuller Center's abilities to help people with housing will grow.

"I'd like to see us put up homes for people who need them," he said. "There are so many people here in the Silver Valley living in substandard housing, like old trailers and such."

Even though he has lived in the Silver Valley for 30 years, Bob says he is discovering new places in the valley he has never visited before. For instance, he had never spent much time in Osburn, and never seen the Sunny Slopes subdivision on the north side of that town. He said he is amazed at the size of that subdivision, having been built out of the wilds.

Sunny Slopes can be an inspiration towards providing housing for more residents in the Silver Valley. All it takes is donations of money, materials, time or labor. Bob encourages people to get involved with Fuller Center, which meets the second Tuesdays of each month at the Mountain View Congregational Church on Cameron Avenue in Kellogg. They are always looking for volunteers of all skill levels. "Usually volunteers can be doing anything from putting in footings to pouring cement to roofing," he said

He plans to continue helping any way he can. "I have enjoyed it very much, being with the board," he said. "It's very rewarding."
