



We live in timber country, where large swaths of forest are harvested for building materials and paper and all of the things that wood provides.

Once a section is cleared, new seedlings are planted for another crop. What's remarkable about this is that the seedlings won't be harvested for 20 years-what a commitment to the future! We're also surrounded by cotton, peanuts and muscadines [grapes], all of which have a more modest one year turnaround. But the divine model is the same—seeds are sown, the plants are nurtured and a crop is harvested. Now the fundamental step in this process is the first one—planting the seed. And that's what we've been doing here at The Fuller Center from our earliest days. Casting seeds far and wide and then watching for sprouts-interest in forming a new covenant partnership, a potential volunteer or donor, a family in need of a decent home—and then finding ways to nurture that sprout 'til it bears fruit. And it's working! Thanks to you, The Fuller Center is helping more families than ever before to have a decent home. Covenant partners in 70 U.S. cities and 18 other countries are hard at work making sure that your gifts of time and money are doing the best job they possibly can.

The cycle continues. We're still sowing seeds while reaping a huge harvest from seeds that were sown earlier. And it's all because of friends like you. We are truly grateful to have you as a partner in this great harvest of kindness.




Mark your calendars.
