

Avid cyclist jumps at this unique opportunity

We are now one week into the virtual "Around the world in 80 days" tour. Last Friday, Judy and Verne Blalack and I kicked off our tour walking from their home at Cataldo, Idaho, along the beautiful North Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River.

After they returned to their house, I got on my recumbent tricycle to add some more miles. The first 2 days of the tour were really hot by North Idaho standards, so I was glad I had brought my spray water bottle

I am secretary of the local Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing. I joined the board in January 2013 after moving to Kellogg upon retiring from my 35 years as an archivist with the Montana Historical Society.

I've been an enthusiastic bicyclist for many years. I have done trips with VBT (Vermont Bicycle Tours) in Austria, Holland, Croatia and other places in Europe and in Vermont, Maine, New York and Mississippi in the US. One of the reasons I retired to Kellogg was the availability of the fabulous Trail of the Coeur d'Alene rails to trails. Other motivations were two ski areas and a river suitable for paddling.

In March of this year, the coronavirus hit Idaho. I immediately thought "I've got to keep myself mentally and physically healthy". Since both ski areas had been forced to shut down due to the virus, I decided I would try to bicycle every day that the weather permitted. At first it was quite a challenge. I could only go 2 or 3 miles before I was in packed snow. A recumbent trike does not do well in snow. By early April as the snow began melting off the trail, I was able to gradually extend my rides. Riding the Trail of the Coeur d'Alene along the Coeur d'Alene River is a real pleasure. It became even more beautiful as the trees and bushes began greening up.

When I learned of the virtual bike tour the Fuller Center for Housing International was planning. I became an instant convert. The Fuller Center's Bike Adventures had been coming through Kellogg, Idaho, during their cross-country tours for several years. I was very impressed with the dedication of the riders who would spend their occasional 2-3 days off bicycling in helping with local community Fuller Center projects along their route.

The last two summers they spent a weekend with our local Fuller Center for Housing. They climbed ladders to repaint second story windows, repaired roofs and porches, and whatever other tasks were needed. They were always upbeat and friendly. So, I decided I wanted to repay some of the help the bikers had given us. I formed a team which I called "Team Silver Valley Idaho".

Judy and Verne Blalack immediately joined the team and became my first sponsors. They also recruited their son and daughter- in- law George and Melody Blalack. Although George and Melody live in Hawaii, they were happy to be part of our Silver Valley team.

Join us in a non-competitive 13-mile bicycle ride from the Enaville Trailhead to The Snake Pit via a portion of the lovely "Trail of the Cd'As" from Enaville to Cataldo, then onto the historic CCC-Wall Ridge route, a picturesque road that winds along and above the Cd'A River beginning at Cataldo and ending at Enaville on the North Fork of the Cd'A River.

shirts: Commemorative shirts for all participants. Pick up at check-in.

DISTANCE: Approximately 13 miles.

EQUIPMENT: Mountain & Hybrid bicycles recommended. ANSI or Bell helmets <u>mandatory</u> for <u>all</u> riders. Recommend participants have a bicycle safety inspection prior to event.

ENTRY: \$40 - payable to Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing. Must be postmarked by August 29th.

LATE ENTRY: After Aug 29th or in person 1-3 pm on race day - \$50. Late registrations will not be guaranteed shirts the day of the race.

CHECK-IN: Saturday, Sept. 12, 1-3 pm. The Snake Pit outdoor pavilion. Packets & drinks will be picked up.

PRE-EVENT: MEETING & START: 3 pm - parking lot at Enaville Trailhead of the "Trail of the Coeur d'Alenes", across the road from The Snake Pit. Less experienced riders start at 3:15, others at 3:30 pm. Course closes at 5 pm.

FINISH: . The Snake Pit.

POST EVENT: RALLY: Outdoor pavilion — The Snake Pit: offers a free pulled pork sandwich, slaw, beans, & lemonade <u>for participants only</u>—or \$10 for non-participants

PARKING INFO: Come early; park in designated areas. <u>Please</u> keep the front parking lot clear for patrons—please!

COURSE INFORMATION: - From Enaville to Cataldo: approximately 5 miles of paved trail. -The Wall: approximately 8 miles -.one-lane, gravel, dirt road, rocky on the uphill (1-mile of uphill is rigorous), downhill is a typical logging road with some sharp corners.-.speeds up to 20-30 mph may be reached. Off the Wall to Enaville: approximately ½ mile alongside the Cd'A River Road. Traffic should be minimal on the paved sections, and the rigorous portion of the Wall will be closed to all but emergency traffic and course marshals from 3-5:15 pm. - Volunteers will be on the course to flag, give directions, and indicate upcoming turns on the downhill portion. Aid station with water on top of the wall.

COURSE INSPECTION: The course is on public roads and is open for pre-event rides. Please be aware that the course is a public road, people live along the route, and traffic laws and rules do apply!

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




