
Avoiding Misconceptions (edited and reprinted from 2004)

A Fuller Center home is a HAND UP not a hand out. A common misconception is that our families are getting their homes for free. The most important people involved in building a Fuller home is the partner family. Here's how it works:

- Potential homeowners are selected on the basis of need, ability to repay a no-profit, no interest mortgage, and willingness to partner with a Fuller Center Covenant Partner.
- ◆ Fuller Center builds modest houses of about 1,100 square feet in the U.S. Monthly mortgage payments are low.
- Our homeowners pay for their houses by investing hundreds of "sweat equity" hours and by paying their monthly mortgage payments.
- ♦ House payments revert back to a "Building Fund" so additional houses can be built.
- Our local affiliate is known as Silver Valley Fuller Center for Housing. SVFCH is a nonprofit housing ministry based on Christian principles.
- Volunteers fill key roles in the Fuller Center work, both on the construction site and in other positions such as family selection, family support and advocacy, fund raising and gifts of its supporters. SVFCH welcomes all to join in the work.

The Fuller Center Bikers are not coming here this year. They will go across South Idaho. Go to www.fullercenter.org to join them.

The Meaning of Poor

I've been thinking recently about who are the "poor". King David in the Old Testament, one of the greatest men of all time, often asks the Lord for help in the Psalms, "But I am poor and needy; Yet the Lord thinks upon me." (Psalm 40:17)

One can be poor in health, poor in spirit, poor in worldly goods, poor in strength, poor in memory, etc. Occasionally we make "poor" choices that lead to less than optimum conditions. Sometimes the folks in these circumstances are viewed as unworthy and made to feel that way..

Perhaps I'm wrong in assuming that all of us have been in situations where we needed a helping hand. I vividly remember being stranded in what seemed to be the middle of nowhere. It was shortly after Verne & I were married. On our way home from job hunting, we arrived in a small town with only 2 little cans of beans & 57¢. Verne was able to find a short term job with a friendly farmer, and with a small loan, we were able to keep going. My memories now are of a delightful month spent in a friendly town.

The internet has been a forum for discussion between some of the our homeowners. They want us to remember they are people just like us with hopes and trials and dreams. As one lady put it, she is still the same person, but "my curtains don't wave at me."

I asked Rev. Dan Vellinga of our Partnership Committee to help clarify this issue for me:

Who Are The Poor?

Judy Blalack received a fascinating story about the poor from an e-mail sent to her. It's about a family in 1946, who had very little but decided to give sacrifically when they heard that there was an offering for the poor being collected in their church. When the offering was taken, the family gave the most and were shocked when the pastor came by later to give them the offering. They never dreamed that they were the "poor family in church". One week later, a missionary spoke at the church and asked for an offering to help a church overseas finish their building. The family donated the offering they had received one week before. The missionary was thrilled at the sizable offering and replied, "You must have some rich people in this church!" They were rich this Sunday. The Sunday before they had been the poorest family in the church.

As I thought about this, I asked myself to define "poor" as I understood it. I decided, while walking home from my office the other day, that someone could possibly be considered poor if they could not earn enough money to provide food and adequate shelter, set aside some money to give to those who are struggling; and save for retirement or other future needs, such as children's education. I was struck by the impression that many "middle-class" people work from paycheck to paycheck and cannot afford to save anything. Because of this, one could argue that the majority of the people in our nation are poor. But, compared to the trials of many in other countries, where they are forced to live off of what they can gather from the land and whose shelters are simply whatever they can make with their bare hands, almost everyone in the United States are, if not rich, certainly not poor. "Poor", it seems is a very subjective word.

And, it's a word that, I suspect, Jesus does not want us to work hard to define. Look at the passage in Scripture in which Jesus answers the question, "Who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:25-37) The neighbor, according to an expert in Scripture of Jesus' day, was the person who showed mercy to someone in need. Conversely, any of us can find ourselves in circumstances in which we need help. That, perhaps, is what it means to be poor. Some are poor more often than others, but everybody is poor sometimes. Jesus knew this. That is why he expects us to be neighbors.




