#### The Fuller Center International



At the recent Fuller Center for Housing International Board meeting, Judy Blalack presented President David Snell with a tithe check from SVFCH. Our first president while we were with Habitat, Norma Seaton, insisted we make a monthly tithe, noting that the Lord repays many times over.

Our tithe goes toward building materials for homes in 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries. The average cost is \$5,000 for a 400 sq. ft. home. Some have outside kitchens and toilets depending on existing conditions, including climate and running water. Construction is with concrete blocks or bricks—a huge upgrade from dirt floors, flimsy walls and thatch roofs. In other locations the homes have indoor kitchens and toilets. These are safe, clean, secure homes that fit the culture. People with secure dwellings don't want to emigrate. These overseas Fuller groups tithe back to the Fuller Center where the funds are reinvested in new projects.

The Fuller Center is building in 19 countries. Global Builders travel to 14 of these countries. Twenty-nine trips are already full, but there are 11 more with open registration. Learn more at https://fullercenter.org/upcoming-trips/

Habitat for Humanity has put a moratorium on accepting new affiliates and is setting the requirements high for small affiliates. They are giving those who don't make the cut three options: go on their own; find another non-profit partner; or join The Fuller Center. They provide our contact information and are making the transitions as smooth as possible—allowing them to keep their assets. We are working with 15 affiliates who will become Covenant Partners like SVFCH.

Judy went expecting to resign her second term of office due to the difficulty of making it to Americus, Georgia. But, she will be able to attend future meetings by video and so will remain on the board. She represents the western US and also the small Covenant Partners with hands on local experience. With the transfer of additional Habitat affiliates, the west will be better represented.

### **Dare to Imagine**

**Dare To Imagine** was originated by the members of the Ministerial Association and the three Silver Valley School Superintendents.

We chose the name "Dare To Imagine", because it is so universal. From a young child daring to imagine that they can make a free throw, to our group daring to imagine what our community would be like with no unemployment and no suicide.

It is our goal that when facing adversity, to replace despair and depression with hope and to imagine a solution and a brighter future. And we want to inspire our youth to "**Dare To Imagine**" their future and strive to embrace their own goals.

So what have we accomplished toward our goals?

Our first major project was creating a summer school program that was founded on building good morals and a strong character.

Children from across the Silver Valley have attended our four day programs over the past three summers. The school is free and the first two years we averaged 160 youth. But the past two years we have had 250+ participants, and over 100 volunteers.

We are currently working towards laying the foundation for the upcoming summer school program as well. It will be held Monday, July 22nd - Thursday July 25th.

This year's activities include

- basketball.
- arts and crafts,
- drama,
- music,
- mountain biking,
- cooking,
- a science program with the Mobius Science center out of Spokane,
- and an aeronautics and aviation program, golf, equestrian, and various other activities.

## In addition to the summer program, our group has tried to improve our valley by encouraging volunteerism and community leadership.

We have also have launched a community volunteer appreciation dinner. The first two years we provided a dinner to recognize community leaders throughout the valley. This was a no cost dinner that included mayors, council people, school board members, county commissioners and other community leaders. The past year we had decided to not just honor community leaders, but also community volunteers. This year we have chosen to recognize high school students, from the three local high schools, that exemplify the spirit of volunteerism. They are: from Kellogg—Sierra Keele, Grant Turner, and Chloe Wilbur; from Wallace—Will Farkas, Maggie Howard, and John Webb; from Mullan—Emily Dykes and Riley Trogden.

While I stated at the beginning that the Dare To Imagine Committee was originated by the members of the Ministerial Association and the three school superintendents. Our group has now grown to include several community volunteers. We usually meet once per month at 8 A.M. on the first Wednesday of each month. We welcome anyone that share our goals to join our committee and our effort to encourage everyone to "Dare To Imagine" a better life and brighter future for the Silver Valley.




