Construction at the Osburn house

Work continues at John Boy's future home in Osburn. Before the water can be turned on, a hot water heater needs to be installed. We are checking with the Avista Rebate Program to see if this house will qualify and what the specific requirements are since the organization owns the house at this time and is serving as the contractor. There are a number of improvements where the Rebate Program can help: water heater, furnace, and weatherization including windows. They found no insulation at all in the south facing exterior wall. A gas fireplace had served as heater for the home, but it was not safely installed so a gas furnace will replace it. There is no insulation under the floors, and more is needed in the attic.

John Boy has been assigned a guardianship role for the property. He works inside the house whenever possible cleaning walls, etc.
